

From William, our Minister & Friend



Wow! What a year we had last year. If you were at the first service of 2023 you will have seen the video of all our highlights which lasted for 10 minutes. It genuinely could have been longer because there was so much to pack in.

This year our church celebrates its 200th year. What a great achievement, only possible because of God and the hard work, dedication and service you as God's people have put in to this church here in the centre of Port Glasgow.

As we reach our 200th year, we are in a good place. Our church is growing, not just on a Sunday morning but look at our facilities, they are used 7 days a week, from morning until night. There are around 20 plus children in our Sunday Club, a great bunch of children and around 270 young people in our youth organisations.

However, we have over 400 people on our membership roll which means there is still a large number of people that we are not connecting with. I appreciate for some of you that is due to ill health, mobility etc. If you are reading this and haven't been to church in sometime, we look forward to welcoming you back with us.

On Sunday 22nd January I was delighted that the Moderator of the General Assembly had chosen to come and spend a Sunday with us. The Moderator invited himself, he had heard about our congregation, especially through social media, had seen the amazing work that is going on here and wanted to come and see for himself.

The day was very special, he preached a powerful sermon and presented 5 of our well-loved and valued elders with long service certificates. I am extremely proud of everyone; I cannot thank you enough for how hard you worked to ensure that the Moderator's visit was a great day.

In general though, I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you who are connected and contributing to the life and work of our church all year round. Please be assured that I absolutely appreciate you all, everything that happens here happens because you are all an amazing bunch of people. You should all be proud of the part you play in ensuring this church continues to be missional and continues to serve the people of Port Glasgow every day of the week.

The role of Parish Minister has changed beyond all recognition. Sadly, the days of a parish minister visiting all of their parishioners from Monday to Sunday, sitting for a wee chat and a cup of tea are becoming more and more difficult. I am really struggling with this as much as I would love to do it.

Parishes are much larger, workload is increasing with myself carrying out just over 60 funerals last year, up from 38 the previous year. If our parish increases again with the new presbytery plan, that will obviously only increase.

This is why I absolutely appreciate all that you do. The church doesn't revolve round one person, it's all of us working together, serving our parish, serving our Lord. As I reach my third year with you, I look forward to us all coming together throughout the year to celebrate 200 years of this wonderful church.

Hello Everyone,

Firstly, let me start by saying "Thank You" for the welcome I've received at Port Glasgow New Parish since I joined you on January 1st.

I am a Ministry student for the United Reformed Church and my mode of ministry will be Non-Stipendiary Model 4 (NSM4), which is



similar in some ways to Ordained Local Ministry in the Church of Scotland. However, one of the main differences is that my call to Ministry is supported by the Congregation where I will be ordained and work. This will be Greenock East United Reformed Church (formerly East Congregational Church). I have been an Elder in Greenock East URC since 1998.

I already know many of the lovely people of New Parish as I lived in Port Glasgow from age 8 to 24 and attended Port Glasgow High School. I also worked in The Co-Op at Dubbs Road for seven years.

After University, I became an English teacher and have worked in Notre Dame High School, Greenock since August 2000 and will continue to work there, post-Ordination.

I am married and have been blessed with two daughters and one son who are 20, 18 and 16.

I have been a lifelong member of 14th Greenock Boys' Brigade and have been the Company Captain since 2002. I am also a "No One Dies Alone Companion" with Compassionate Inverclyde and I try to volunteer at Port Glasgow Church Angels Foodbank, when I can.

My call to ministry began many years ago but I didn't act on it until I began training as a Lay Preacher in 2014. I completed that training in 2017, becoming a General Assembly Accredited Lay Preacher for the United Reformed Church.

Like many churches in the UK, the URC, is looking to equip the

kingdom through work in local congregations and in 2020 I offered for Ordination as a NSM4 minister. I was delighted to be accepted and have been well supported by family, friends, work colleagues and fellow Ordinands.

My training has three strands: The Scottish College (Congregational and United Reformed), Theology and Religious Studies at Aberdeen University and church placements. As part of training I am undertaking an Ecumenical placement to observe the life of a Parish minister in the Church of Scotland. I was very grateful that Rev. William and the Kirk Session were able to accommodate me.

So far, I've enjoyed being part of New Parish and I look forward to the months ahead. I am so impressed with how open and welcoming everyone has been and I am enjoying making new friends and reconnecting with old friends.

Future plan – We are now looking in to monthly gatherings where we can all come together perhaps in a venue such as Costa or the Tesco Café, simply to catch up, support each other and give people a place and a space to belong. It will also allow us to perhaps invite speakers along, for example from Man on Inverclyde, SAMH, etc or someone who can discuss a particular topic in regard to mental well-being.

We aim to keep our group completely FREE. We can only do this thanks to the generosity of local grant funding and from our new partnership with the Co-op.

Do you shop at the Co-op? Do you have a membership card? If you do, you can sign up to support our group. Every time you use your card at the checkout, you are raising money for our Lighthouse group. So far Co-op customers have raised £70 for our group, but you have until October, so that figure will hopefully continue to rise.



New Presbytery Plan

At the November 2022 Kirk Session it was agreed to accept the Presbytery Plan which left us as a separate entity in Port Glasgow with Rev William Boyle as our Minister. It was also noted that Presbytery had recommended that Hamilton Bardrainney Church was to be linked with Wellpark Mid Kirk in Greenock.

On the 17th December 2022, all Inverciyde churches were invited to a meeting to discuss an update on the plan. On the 4th January we received sight of this new plan.

The Presbytery Planning Committee sent the following

"After having taken time to read the comments from the draft planning proposal and to consider the feedback we have received from various parties, the following revision to Port Glasgow is proposed by the Presbytery Planning team"

Port Glasgow New and **Hamilton Bardrainney** are invited to come together to discuss the future of the church in Port Glasgow, with Hamilton Bardrainney becoming a **local mission church**. This would enable the two different styles of worship and theology to co-exist in a way which demonstrated to the wider community, churches working together despite perceived historical differences, which we believe there is a desire to see healed and transformed.

The geography of the Port Glasgow area suggests that the unity of the church with its Port Glasgow identity, makes for a more sustainable model for the future, becoming a more cohesive ministry and better use of resources in that area. The increased burden on Rev William Boyle funerals, would mean that others would be encouraged to step up to assist in roles normally left to the minister alone. We would be suggesting the use of worship leaders and readers to help to make this a success. As yet, no OLM support has been allocated in Presbytery. Both buildings would remain as category "A".

The meeting of all churches to discuss the above took place on the **10th January at Wellpark Mid Kirk.** As William had been on holiday for two weeks, it was not possible to call a Kirk Session?

prior to the above meeting on the 10th January. At that meeting the representatives from Port Glasgow New Parish reported that the Kirk Session had not had a chance to discuss the proposal, however a discussion paper would be prepared for the next Kirk Session meeting which was scheduled for 26th of January. It was felt that an outright yes or no would be wrong at this stage until all the facts were known and Kirk Session had the opportunity to discuss the draft plan.

At its meeting on the 26th January, following a great deal of discussion, it was agreed to go back to Presbytery with a whole list of unanswered questions before any decision could be made

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved." (Acts ch 2)

How many recipe books do you have at home? Some people have lots and read them like a novel. Others have just a few, well-used with pages dog eared and covered in food marks. Some people make up their own recipes as they go and wait to see what the food tastes like. Some families have recipes which are passed down from generation to generation, not written down but done from memory. Whatever recipes you have or how you use them there are always key ingredients which need to be included to get the best results.

The verses from Acts at the top of the page are what Luke describes as the key ingredients for a fellowship of believers: spending time together, giving time to the teaching of the apostles and to fellowship; sharing everything by selling their possessions and giving to the poor; breaking bread together and praising God in worship and prayer. What happened when the key ingredients were used? *The Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.*

A challenge for Lent! If we use the key ingredients in our recipe, as we journey to the cross during the season of Lent and if we show our faith by our actions as well as in our worship and prayer, with God's help, we will add to the numbers in New Parish and we will know Jesus much better by the time we get to Good Friday.

Gracious God, we thank You that we can grow together in faith and share Your love with others. Help us to remember the key ingredients we need in our lives so that we can truly say we are Your disciples.

As we journey through Lent and to the foot of the cross let us give thanks in our prayers for the gift of Your Son, for the victory over death, and for His dying so that we could have life. Thank You for the plan You have for each of us and for the Bible and its stories which show us how to be like You. In Jesus' name we pray.

Our Newly Refurbished Halls





Celebrations were in order for principal euphonium player Rachel O'Connor, after she accepted an offer to study trombone at the Royal Academy of Music in London.

The former Inverclyde Academy pupil, already a student at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland's



Junior Conservatoire (Music), will commence studies on the undergraduate degree in London in September.

Meanwhile, RYB pupils enjoyed plenty of successes at the recent Inverclyde Music Festival, which returned after a Covid-enforced absence.



The senior brass solo competition saw bass trombonist Hannah McInnes come first, winning the JA Sloan Trophy, ahead of Andrea Crumlish (tenor horn) and Ash Paton (cornet) in joint second.

Trombonist Scott Smith won his solo class, as did baritone player, Stuart Smith, while in their class, Kyle Baxter (cornet) was second and trombone player Andrew Smith was third 23.

Andrea performed at the festival's celebration concert in Greenock Town Hall and was awarded the Gerard F Gordon Trophy in recognition of her outstanding contribution to the festival, in which she excelled in a range of classes including brass, piano and singing.

Further solo success for Riverside members came in the West of Scotland Solo Championships on February 4. In the



senior solo category, Andrea Crumlish was second, ahead of Siobhan Crumlish in third and Hannah McInnes in fourth.

All three qualified for the Scottish Solo Championships, as did Ash Paton, who gained a Gold Award in the intermediate solo class, in which Scott and Andrew Smith received Silver Awards.

Baritone player Stuart Smith, meanwhile, received a Gold Award in the junior solo competition.

Riverside Youth Band also returned to the stage at Inverclyde Music Festival, with musical director Mark Good commenting: "Getting the opportunity to perform at Inverclyde Music Festival has been wonderful for so many of our young people, who have excelled themselves at this prestigious event.

Mark continued: "I'm also very proud of Rachel O'Connor, as she prepares to begin studies at London's Royal Academy of Music later in the year. 
We then had a




