The Church of Scotland is going through one of the most challenging times in its history. The new Presbytery Mission Plans have been tough in a variety of different ways, especially if you are a congregation who has been marked

for closure. We have seen so many churches close and merge across Scotland this year and I am afraid that will be the case in 2024 too as we adjust to new ways of being the Church.

In 2019 we saw the union of St Martin's and St Andrew's to form New Parish Church. You will remember how you felt when this was discussed, announced and when for example, St Martin's closed down. That is how people will be feeling across Scotland right now. It feels like not just our local church is slowly but surely closing down but the whole organisation.

As much as it is not easy and we know that there will be tough decisions to come and we know that people will feel that sense of loss, look at what has been achieved here at New Parish Church since our union.

We had a successful union. We have a wonderful church family, a growing church with over 40 new members, we are very busy on a Sunday morning with nearly 30 children if they were

all there in the same week, very busy during the week, open 7 days, serving our community.

We also have so many future plans for our building to ensure that it is a "well equipped space in the right place." I am delighted that soon we will open the new Sheena Morgan Hall, dedicated to a wonderful friend and servant of God.

Those examples show that there is hope for the future. Although closures and mergers will be hard, something new can grow and flourish as we work together to share the good news of Christ across our nation.

In Christ we have hope for the future. He is the hope given to us as a gift from God. He is the hope of the world assured through his work on the cross.

This Christmas time, come and join your church family as we celebrate the birth of the Messiah, the one who gives us hope, the one who taught us to love and to serve. We give thanks to God for sending us the best gift of all, his own son Jesus to be our Lord and our Saviour.

I know this is something we did in the past and with Covid restrictions it did fall away. We have really wanted to get the services back up and running and I am delighted that on a monthly basis we are now able to do so.

## 20 Pence a Day Scheme

Did you know that for over 20 years now we have been running a fund called the "Twenty Pence a Day Scheme?" This started in order to fund the installation of the link and disabled access toilets. Over the years a group of dedicated members have continued to contribute faithfully and I have to say a big thank you to them all.

Apart from the money raised for the link, which was over £100,000 the fund has paid for:

- The carpeting in the Church, over £5,000
- The upgrade of the Manse, over £50,000
- A new front door for the Manse, over £1,100
- The CCTV system around the Church, over £1,500

Plus various replacement items in the Manse including shower and toilet repairs.

Recently the fund has paid £6,000 for the security fences around the Church which has stopped the criminal damage and drug misuse at at the link door.

As I said, a band of willing members have been contributing over the years and I am now looking to widen this and appealing for more members of the congregation to join the scheme.

It is so simple just save twenty pence each day and put it in an envelope in the basket at the church vestibule. Kathleen has a supply of brown envelopes which she will be happy to pass onto you. We record the amount by name to allow us to claim Gift Aid back if you pay tax.

Some people pay by standing order each month and some people



pay annually. It is completely up to you and as you can see provides great help to the Church.

Please give this some consideration and if you wish to join the scheme, just see Kathleen G.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."(John 3:16 NIV)

This short prayer is well known to some of the ladies in the church because it is the Guild prayer:

Heavenly Father, thank you for loving me right where I am. Help me to know that love deep in my heart and enable that love to flow from me to those with whom I am in contact. Amen

In less than 40 words it sums up our relationship with God. The two-way relationship of receiving and sharing God's love. Love is at the heart of our relationship with God. Love should be present in all our conversations with God. God loves us constantly and unconditionally, as a parent loves a child but that love is only valuable if we take it and use it and pass it on to others. Love is the binding force which keeps us together. If we take it and selfishly keep it, then what a waste of God's wonderful love.

During this season of Advent as we look forward to the birth of Jesus, we think of the Advent candles for hope, peace, joy, and love. God's love came to us at Christmas, in human form, as the baby born in Bethlehem. Think of the words of the hymn, Love came down at Christmas, and the third verse, "Love shall be our token, love be yours and love be mine, love to God and all men, love for plea and gift and sign."

Love, like a puppy, is not just for Christmas. The scriptures are full of passages about love. Love was present at Jesus' birth and at the time of his death. At the Last Supper, Jesus instructed the disciples, "to love one another". Jesus said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." (John 13:34 NIV), and in Matthew's gospel, Jesus answered the teacher of the Law,. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment." The second is like it: love your neighbour as yourself. (Matthew 22: 37) Why is love crucial to the greatest commandments? Love is at the centre of our faith. We need to give love to God and others.

Some people are easy to love but others are not. We need to love the unlovable too. God's love which he wants us to share is inclusive. Love draws together the lonely, the rejected and those who feel they have failed. Love accepts and forgives. So, when we pray for others, we must pray for all. In church, as in life, we have different personalities, brought together in one fellowship. Let's pray that love will bind us together.

When we pray, we should ask God to help us fulfil the two great commandments. As loving parents make plans for their children, so in his infinite love God makes plans for all of us.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11 NIV)

#### **Mission & Outreach Committee**

Our church Mission and Outreach Committee had their first meeting a few weeks ago and we all agreed that it was a very productive meeting. The group discussed what they think mission and

outreach means within the church and why we need a committee.

We discussed various statistics concerning our town of Port Glasgow and we were all shocked to discover that the town has a very high mortality rate of death by cancer, heart disease and alcohol. There is also a feeling from the locals that there is a lack of activities relating to Health & Wellbeing which would support children, young people and adult groups .

On a good note the people of Port Glasgow believe that one of our greatest assets is our community spirit.

We looked at what is already available in Port Glasgow and agreed there is a need to create something that isn't already being done. Some of our ideas were to employ someone using an already available fund which would enable us to connect with the community and try to gain some ideas on what they would like the church to provide.

We thought about having a service once a month out with the church, a Cafe Church idea. Different venues were suggested with one being Mojo's Cafe on Princes Street. Would this connect with those that don't attend the church building? How do we connect with families? Could we have a short 15 min service after New Parish Playgroup to connect with parents? As a group we have had some good ideas to work on. With Christmas fast approaching we focused on what is coming up within the church.

Blue Christmas is returning again this year with bereaved families being invited along to the service. Bubblegum and Fluff will be back for P5 pupils from Newark Primary. To tie in with this, the pupils of P5 from Newark Primary will be



invited to create a poster on their idea of the Nativity Story which we hope will be displayed in Tesco, Port Glasgow.

Joyful Angel Project is running once more. Maureen is looking for volunteers to be our Angels and also looking for any nominations of recipients to receive our Joyful Angel gifts. Please see Maureen in church on a Sunday or contact the church pages.



Cubs and Scouts were also given the challenge to complete some at-home badges during their October break; these are typically badges that we cannot cover in a Monday night session. We are lucky to have been



Our young people had such a fun time, that the Scouts have been pestering our leaders to go back as soon as possible, which is also a first.

We are looking forward to hosting our annual group camp again in a couple of weeks, where Beavers, Cubs and Scouts will be going to Lapwing Lodge for a weekend in the woods (but we will be sleeping indoors). You will also hopefully have seen us standing proud in our uniforms at Remembrance Sunday, paying our respects to those we lost through war. In the weeks ahead we'll also be wrapping up some final badges for the year, and looking forward to a quiet break

over Christmas.



Let me also express our gratitude for the continued support of New Parish Church and the community. It is a joy to bring you these

updates with each issue of this magazine and it gives us an opportunity to reflect on the time we've spent, the work we've done with our young people and the difference we are hopefully making in each of their lives.

## 1st Port Glasgow Girls' Brigade

We were delighted to begin the new session in August and welcome the girls back into 1st PG GB. We've had a strong start with lots of new girls in Explorers and Juniors, which is superb. The girls have settled well into the routine of Thursday nights at Girls' Brigade.

Badgework activities have begun in all three Sections. 'Exploring the Ocean' is the theme in Explorers. So far, they have explored the stories of Noah and Jonah, learned the names of the Oceans and where they are situated. They have learned about different sea creatures and made Sharks and Jellyfish. They still have lots more Exploring to do as we go through the session.

The Juniors have started their topics – their Spiritual topic is 'Behind the Badge'. This is based on the different elements of the GB Badge and the symbolism they portray. Today the GB badge is a symbol that unites our members around the world.

The Educational topic is 'All About Bumblebees', raising awareness of bumblebees in the UK and their importance to our lives.

'Sugar Rush' is their Physical topic. Sugar is something that's loved around the world. They'll learn about how sugar is produced, the history of sugar and hear about the small-scale sugar cane farmers whose lives are reliant on this sweet treat.



Rounding off the badge work is their Service topic 'Sustainability'. The Physical and Service topics are led by our three trainee leaders, to complete their Gold Leadership training. After which they will be Commissioned as Leaders in Girls' Brigade.

The Brigaders are 'Exploring the Bible' and seeking to understand that it was never meant to be a solitary activity. This topic gets them talking together about stories in the Bible and thinking about what they mean to them.

The Educational topic is 'Quick Creative Exercises' where videos introduce quick activities designed to promote creativity. They can inspire new ways of thinking, explore the world we know differently or spark the imagination. Most of all they are great fun.

The Physical topic is 'Commonwealth Ceilidh'. As part of the Culture 2014 celebrations, the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society was commissioned by Get Scotland Dancing to develop a ceilidh with three brand new dances. The Brigaders will learn these dances, as well as the traditional ones.

The Service badgework is being kept under wraps at the moment. They are organising a special event - all will be revealed at a later date.

We are running monthly Squad Challenges with Juniors and Brigaders. They made arches, that a ball would roll under, using midget gems and cocktail sticks – it would have been easier if it wasn't the warmest night of the session and the midget gems were squidgy!!

Another month they were given sheets of A4 paper and had to cut a hole in one so that Wendy could climb through the hole. Sounds impossible but it's not - if you cut it the right way! Two squads made holes big enough for their smallest girls to go through but one managed a hole big enough for Wendy!!

On Thursday 30th November, 60 of us are heading to the Beacon Arts Centre to see the Greenock Players Pantomime 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We are delighted that two of our Brigaders are in the Pantomime and we're excited to see them on the stage. We also have Christmas Crafts, our Christmas Party and the Church Nativity to look forward to.

Our numbers are good at the moment but there is still space for more girls in all three sections. All school age girls are welcome to join us.


